Scholarship Basics

Unlike student loans, scholarships are gift aid. This means you don't need to pay them back. A scholarship might cover the entire cost of tuition, or it might be a one-time award of a few hundred dollars.

Some scholarships for college are **merit based**. You can earn merit scholarships based on academic achievement or a combination of academics and a specific talent, trait, or interest. Scholarships can also be **need based**, meaning they are based on financial need.

It is also common for scholarships to be geared toward a particular group of people. For instance, there are scholarships granted based on gender, age, where you or your parents work, or background, like scholarships issued to children of military families.
